

## Do you know an outstanding, ethical, global leader?

The Tällberg-SNF-Eliasson Global Leadership Prizes—named in honor of the Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF) and the global diplomat, Jan Eliasson—are given annually to **outstanding leaders** from **any country** and **any discipline** whose work is **innovative, courageous**, rooted in **universal values** and **global** in implication or consequence. We believe that great leadership is not bound by geography or discipline. Prize winners are honored not only for what they have already accomplished but for their commitment and capacity to continue seeking the kinds of positive change our societies demand.

In short: **Global Leaders** and **Global Solutions** for **Global Problems!**

Prize winners may be **nominated by anyone, anywhere** and are ultimately selected by a jury composed of accomplished global leaders.

In 2023, through the generous support of the Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF), we will **award three prizes**. Each winner will be celebrated by their peers, receive an unrestricted grant of \$50,000, and be **invited to join the Tällberg network of global leaders**. Indeed, the ongoing engagement with other leaders working for positive change at the global level is an integral element of the Tällberg-SNF-Eliasson Global Leadership Prize.

Of course, leaders who have more potential than track record are critical to our collective futures. Many such leaders are nominated for the Prize, and several have won it. However, we believe that the Tällberg Foundation is well placed to identify **emerging leaders** because of our global network, philosophy and belief in the permeability of borders and barriers. We have an obligation to nurture such emerging leaders, people who are early in their leadership journeys and already demonstrate huge upside potential.

Our solution, in addition to welcoming emerging leaders in the overall Prize competition, is to **invite roughly two dozen outstanding emerging leaders from the pool of nominations to participate in the Tällberg Foundation's Emerging Leaders Mentoring Program**. That initiative matches emerging leaders with the global leaders who populate our network, including past Prize laureates, in a focused, year-long process of conversation and collaboration designed to accelerate the development of high-potential leaders.

The Tällberg Foundation is committed to the idea that leadership matters, and that **the right leaders with the right motivations can move our societies from where they are to where they need to be**. We are also committed to the idea that you know great leadership when you see it; that is why our process starts with an open call.

The Tällberg Foundation, launched in 1981, exists to explore the issues that are challenging—and changing—our societies. Today, those challenges are profound: the world that we have known since the mid 20th century, which produced unprecedented peace as well as human advance, is changing at a pace and in directions that threaten to evolve towards Orwellian dystopia.

But forces for “good” still exist and need to be renewed, made more muscular and more effective. The Foundation aspires to be part of that process.

Tällberg’s work program focuses on understanding how to re-inject ethics into leadership; re-establish the legitimacy of governance; and manage, instead of being managed by, disruptive technologies, climate change, mass migration and other phenomena. We aim to contribute to the new thinking—and new acting—required by this moment in history
