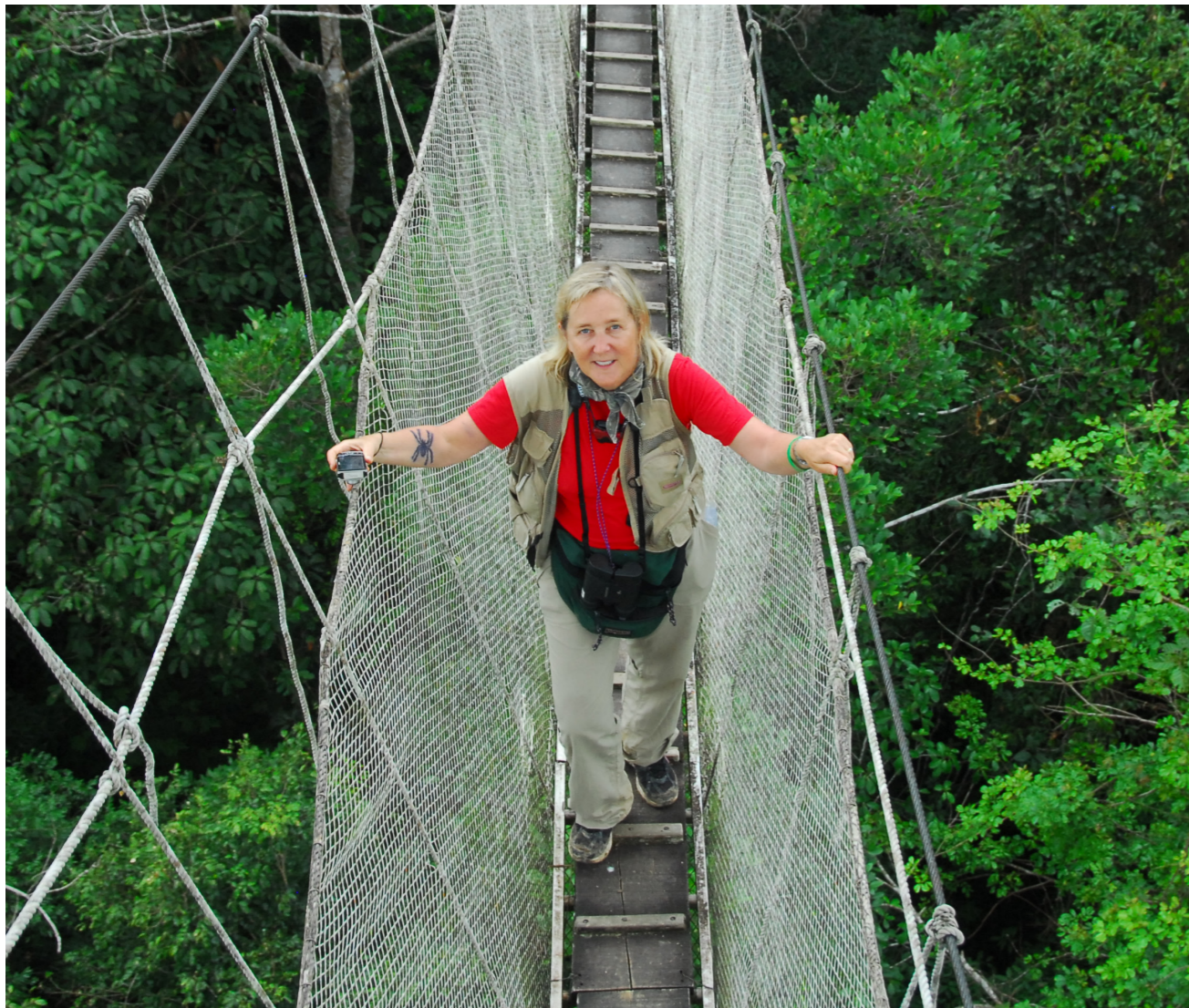

OVERVIEW

The Tällberg-SNF-Eliasson Global Leadership Prizes are awarded annually to outstanding leaders who demonstrate the willingness and capacity to address the complexity of 21st-century challenges and whose work is global in aspiration or implication and is rooted in universal values.

The world faces accelerating climate change, disruptive technology, increasing conflict and war, massive numbers of displaced people seeking safety, all wrapped in the the breakup of the post-war global order that framed and facilitated the great human advances of the past decades.

Extrapolating today's conditions suggests a grim, dystopian future. But the good news is that great leadership can bend the arc of history.

- Leaders who reject the lengthening list of "isms"—nationalism, exceptionalism, racism, wokeism etc.—that substitute for thought today.

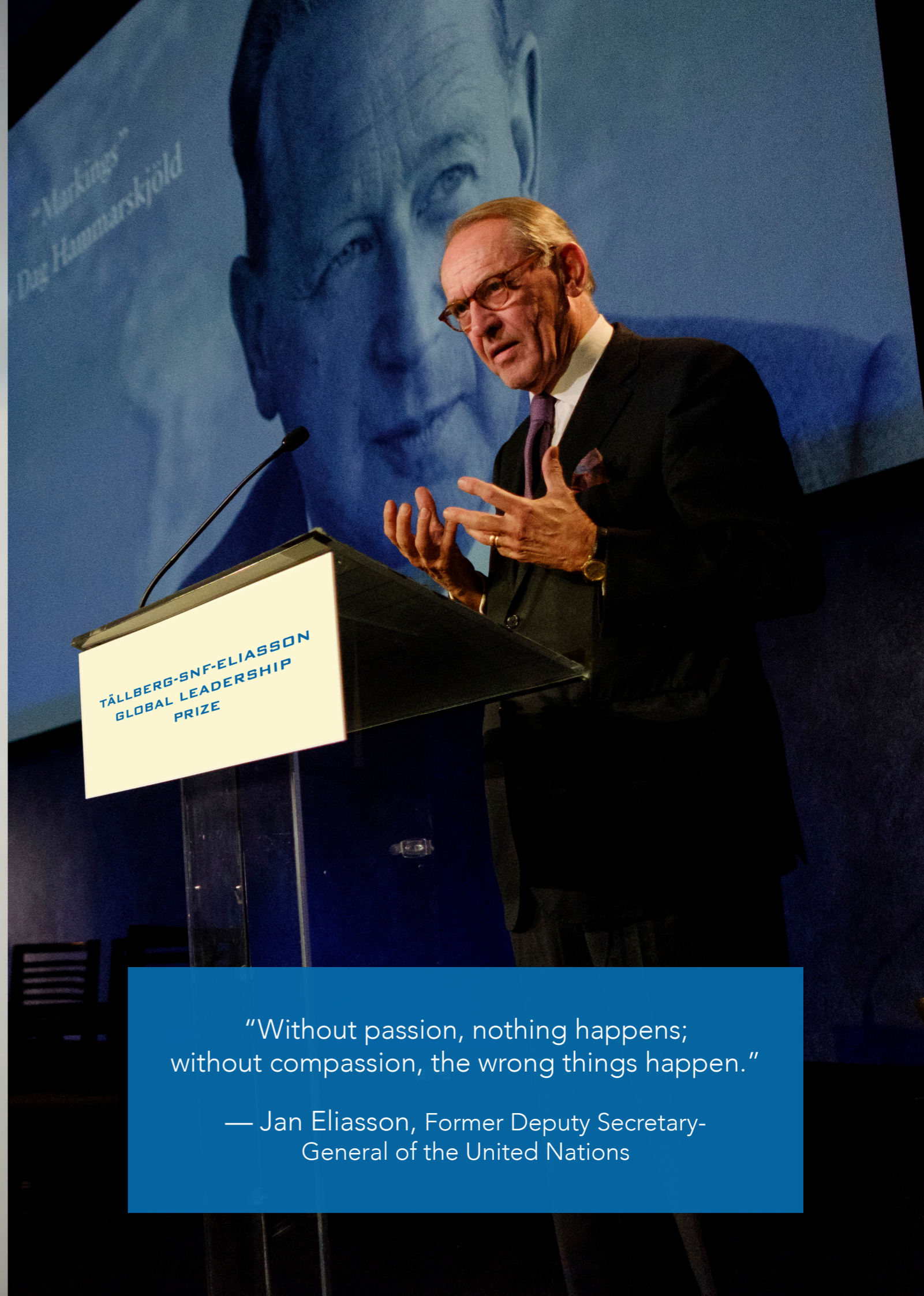

FOSTERING GLOBAL LEADERSHIP IN TIMES OF CHANGE

The board of the Tällberg Foundation—with the fulsome support of the Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF)—decided the Foundation’s core purpose must be to identify, honor, nurture and network great global leaders. The kind of women and men who understand the challenges, who take the risks and who—above all—produce impact.

In that spirit, we established the Tällberg-SNF-Eliasson Global Leadership Prize in 2015, building on ten years of recognizing principled global leadership. The prize honors the Stavros Niarchos Foundation, an innovative grant-making foundation whose support makes it possible, and Jan Eliasson, one of the most accomplished global diplomats of our era. Both SNF and Jan share Tällberg’s deep commitment to encouraging positive global change.

ELIGIBILITY

Prize winners may be nominated online by anyone, anywhere and are ultimately selected by a secret ballot of a jury composed of accomplished global leaders.

- Individuals, not organizations, are eligible for nomination.
- Self-nominations will not be accepted.
- Winners will be celebrated at—and are expected to attend—an award ceremony next January.

SELECTING THE WINNERS

Nominations are reviewed, researched, and vetted by Tällberg staff and a pre-jury of global leaders; the process is designed to define a pool of nominations for consideration by the full jury. The Tällberg-SNF-Eliasson Global Leadership Jury is composed of leaders from different countries, disciplines, experiences and backgrounds. Ultimately, they consider scores of nominations and select winners.

That selection process entails successive rounds of secret balloting, which means that all jurors have equal weight in the selection process. In effect, each year's jury defines its own criteria, and every nominee is judged individually.

- Leaders from any discipline and any part of the world who meet the core criteria of the Prize are eligible.
- Three \$50,000 Prizes are awarded annually.
- Winners become part of a network of leaders working for positive change at the global level.
